


About the Hub

The **Cornwall Music Education Hub** (CMEH) is a partnership of music and arts organisations, both local and national, who work together to support quality musical learning for all children and young people in Cornwall. The partnership is led by Cornwall Council. It is funded by the Department for Education through Arts Council England and leads on the strategic development of Music Education in Cornwall.

PROJECTS AND HUB EVENTS

'A Child's Eye View' - Developing the Whole Child

Parc Eglos Primary School in partnership with MADE (formerly Music and Dance Education - and specialists in creative arts work in education) and the Minack Theatre have been awarded funding to look at the development of 4/5 year-old children in the Helston and Lizard area.

This major research study, 'A Child's Eye View', aims to embed learning through the arts and will look at the links between the performing arts and achievement in language, literacy and personal and social education in ten local primary schools. The Paul Hamlyn Foundation (Teacher Development Fund) has granted £137,000 for this two-year project. Experienced Actors, Dancers and Musicians from MADE will be working with teachers and senior leaders and their children on a weekly basis in their schools. Using dance, drama and music, and with a focus on story, narrative and play, the artists will help to develop teachers' knowledge, skills and experience in supporting the development of speech, language and communication amongst children in the schools' Reception classes.

The weekly visits to schools will also be complemented by termly early years performances, organised by the Minack Theatre, which will take place in schools and also at the stimulating Minack Theatre in Porthcurnow.

The project began in September 2019 with an inspiring Launch event at the Southerly Point Co-Operative Multi Academy Trust offices in Helston - where the Foundation Stage teachers, Senior Teachers and Head teachers from all 10 schools joined forces with representatives from the Minack Theatre and MADE's team of professional artists.





Cornish Culture Project in Redruth

The Cornwall Music Education Hub (CMEH/The Music Hub), The Writers' Block and Kresen Kernow are collaborating this month on an exciting new project. Kan Rag Kernow Yowynk (Song for Cornish Youth) is a project designed to provide children from five Camborne schools a unique insight into their heritage and the opportunity to write and perform songs inspired by this.

The project is based at Kresen Kernow, Cornwall's new archive centre in Redruth and revolves around their current exhibition on John Couch Adams, a nineteenth century farmer's son from Launceston who went on to (nearly) discover Neptune.

Published author Becca Gregson and award-winning performance poet Taran Spalding-Jenkins, both from The Writers' Block, Camborne, are working with the children to help funnel the themes, emotions and history of John Couch Adam's story into the student's very own poems. Musicians Matt Douglas and Patrick Bailey from The Music Hub are then visiting the schools to help the students turn their words into song.

Incorporating creative writing, Cornish history, music and pop-up performances from John Couch Adams, Kan Rag Kernow Yowynk allows these students to creatively explore their local history. The project will culminate in a final performance of the completed songs at Kresen Kernow; a chance for the students to take part in Cornish history and add their voices as the Cornish youth.

Up Bow Kernow!



A pilot project with an ambitious long-term vision to grow the number and level of skilled instrumental teachers working in rural areas and inspire a new generation of young musicians to experience the benefits of group and ensemble music making. Schools in West Cornwall—please join us!

Stage 1 2019-2020: Foundation development for a 2-year teaching apprenticeship scheme to train and retain string teachers in Cornwall, kick-starting a new generation of young string players and launching with a special music parade on Penzance's Mazey Day, June 27th 2020.

Stage 2 2020-2022: Four recent graduates from Royal Birmingham Conservatoire set up base in Penwith and work four days a week in local schools and community settings under supervision from professional music educators, delivering a lively string instrument programme that offers individual, group and large ensemble musical experiences, with enjoyment, quality and skill building at the core.

Stage 3 post apprenticeship: Development of a masters-level vocational qualification based on practical apprenticeship with local partner organisations nationally. A new intake of four student graduates takes over the teaching in Cornwall.

Participating schools: MusicAbility is seeking local schools to be partners in this project — schools who will embrace the general principle that learning a musical instrument and playing together with others benefits young people's rounded development, education, social skills and character. 16 days of instrumental teaching will be on offer to schools each week, 34 weeks a year during the 2 year Stage 2 phase, fully funded. Schools will need to create space in their timetables for students to learn music during the school day and offer a space where music can take place

The project kicks off with a music procession at Penzance's Golowan festival on 27th June 2020, where schools in the region will be supported in developing a mixed-ability performance to highlight the power of music to inspire young people – a single piece of music performed by hundreds of young people and community music groups. (Golowan Festival is asking that participating schools also agree to take part in whichever of the regular Mazey Day schools' parades that they are allocated to.)

Next steps: We'd like to hear feedback from heads or music teachers to gauge the potential level of uptake for both the 2 year **Up Bow Kernow!** project and the Mazey Day music parade.

Geevor Tin Mine



FEATURED ENSEMBLE

CYJO

Cornwall Youth Jazz Orchestra (CYJO) has been in existence since 1983, and continues to provide a top-class platform for young jazz players from all over Cornwall. The ensemble is run by Andy Bilham and James Robinson, both staff members of Cornwall Music Service Trust, and is supported financially by Cornwall Music Education Hub.

CYJO meets once a month at Truro High School for Girls, and performs regularly around the County by invitation. Our repertoire comprises charts from the classic big bands of the 50s and 60s such as the Count Basie Orchestra and Duke Ellington, and we also play contemporary music by Bob Mintzer, Gordon Goodwin and Tower of Power.

Membership of CYJO is not decided by audition; we would rather that prospective players join us for a rehearsal and have chance to relax and enjoy the experience. New members are always welcome, and we would be particularly interested in trombonists, guitarists, pianists and alto sax players. All players are required to have good reading skills because of the lack of rehearsal time available to us.

VOCAL STRATEGY

Sing Eden!

Composers young and old, professional, amateur and emerging have been invited to write for a major choral festival - Sing Eden! in September 2020. More than twenty choirs are signed up for the two day event, coming from Dorset, Devon and Cornwall, with a commitment to perform music which celebrates the wonder of our fragile planet. The Hub has supported and funded Matt Douglas to work with the 14 schools of the Bridge Multi Academy Trust as well as a number of home educated young people to create their own songs, inspired by what they have learnt about climate science. These songs are poised to be turned into choral arrangements through generous support of Arts Council, Feast and The Eden Project among others.

Established writers such as Russell Pascoe, Becky McGlade and Helen Porter from Cornwall are among fourteen composers from across the country who have been commissioned to compose new works for this project.



Free Support for Singing

As part of the Hub's ongoing Vocal Strategy we are offering schools free support through the School Engagement Vocal Outreach Workshops, with the aim of visiting every primary school in Cornwall over the academic year. These free in school one hour vocal workshops, usually for KS2, aim to help schools to develop their singing and are delivered by one of the Hub's Vocal Leaders.

Songs for Earth Project

Earth Songs was a climate change themed collaboration involving the Dicoese of Truro, The Cornwall Federation of WIs (CFWI) and Cornwall Music Education Hub Vocal Strategy and County Choirs and Truro Cathedral. The project started early in the Autumn term in September 2019, with a total of thirteen schools taking part that form the Celtic Cross MAT plus Marazion School. The schools who took part were:

St Petrocs, St Mabyn, St Tudy, Bishop Bronscombe, Lerryn, St Winnow, Veryan, Grampound Road, Grampound Road with Creed, St Michaels, Marhamchurch and Marazion.

The schools were visited during the term by Angela Renshaw who taught two environment themed songs to the schools and introduced simple song arranging along an environment theme, that each school then created themselves. Schools also made their own instruments out of 'junk' and recyclable materials that were used in the final performance of one of the songs.

All schools came together on Sunday 17th November 2019 for a service in Truro Cathedral. The service was preceded by a 'Climate Change Singing March' through the streets of Truro, where the songs that had been arranged by the children were sung, and accompanied by Matt Douglas on accordion.

The Cornwall Federation of WIs stewarded the whole event both through town and in the cathedral, and the BBC came along to film parts of the event that was later shown on TV.

The Cornwall County Youth Choir, directed by Angela Renshaw, sang a very moving piece during the service describing the 'frightening beauty' of earth entitled 'Northern Lights' by Ola Gjeilo and accompanied the procession of children into the cathedral with Mark De Lisser's beautiful arrangement of 'Stand by me'





MUSIC TECHNOLOGY



First Access

Our new offer of First Access in Music Technology for Year 4 students and above are going from strength to strength, and with the initial Autumn term delivery complete we are now building upon its success in the Spring term with many primary and secondary schools taking up this amazing offer from industry experts Si Gordon and John Williams of Black & Gold Audio. The ten-session course introduces teachers and students to the basics of music production and live recording using pre-existing classroom IT equipment (computers or tablets) alongside the free cloud-based software Bandlab and the free IOS software called Tabletop. On the course students develop confidence and engage more with music making through the technology, the course supports creativity and is a catalyst for musical development as well as being an art form in its own right.

Students and teachers alike have commented on how engaging and rewarding the course is, class teachers have stated that 'The class have found this an exciting new adventure and they are very motivated to learn more about music technology as it is relevant, age appropriate and fun as well!' Others said "It has brought our music lessons in to the 21st century making music relevant in today's world of computing and technology."

Students have provided feedback like "Once you've learnt to do things, it's fun. It doesn't matter if

you're not good at it because you can learn. You can do it with your friends. If you don't like the sound you've created you can change it." And 'I like music tech, it is an experience because other children might have disabilities and might not be able to sing and stuff so this involves everyone.'

Saturday Music Production Workshops

The Cornwall Music Education Hub's FREE 6 Week Music Production Workshops are available again this year during in each term. These successful short courses were previously run at dBs Music Cornwall before its closure in 2019, however we were able to acquire some of the equipment in order to continue to offer the provision in different settings around Cornwall.

The Autumn and Spring courses have been taking place at Pool Academy but we will be moving to Truro for the summer course which begins on Saturday 13th June and runs for six consecutive Saturday mornings. Budding music producers between the ages of 11 and 19 years old with an interest in learning and developing music production, recording and technology skills can enroll. Si Gordon of Black & Gold Audio who previously ran these courses at dBs Music leads the course, students explore various DAW software programs, and study the areas of recording, editing and processing of audio and MIDI.

Year 5 pupils In the Launceston area at South Petherwin, St Stephens and Tregadillet schools have been working on composing Christmas songs inspired by Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer. They have thought about how the song words show us that being different can mean that you have a special talent.

The year 6 pupils at St Mabyn have a talent for recorders! They have made fabulous progress in their First Access lessons, and with the enthusiasm and support of the Head Teacher Brigid Howells, they are now preparing for a Christmas concert that includes a three part arrangement of Jingle bells, with some children playing the trebles. The KS2 class at Port Isaac develop their recorder skills over the four years. This has provided the opportunity during project work to create recorder and tuned percussion performances.

Richard Sykes, head of music at Sir James Smith School has taken up First Access on keyboards with the 4 year seven classes. We have only just started lessons, but these have been met with enthusiasm by many of the pupils. The sessions are providing the pupils with the skills they need to read and write music and use keyboards to play melodies and chords. Pupils in reception classes at Bude Infants have recently completed a "Starting with Song project". Using simple repetitive songs with limited pitch has been really effective in developing their singing voices and pitch awareness.

Next term I will be working with primary schools in the Wadebridge area on transition project .

The Autumn term is my favourite term to be teaching in Primary Schools as we get to work towards Christmas performances! Last term each of my First Access Brass schools had the opportunity to perform some fantastic concerts.

Firstly the pupils of class 3 and 4 at St Winnow performed a concert to the rest of the school and their parents with guests from the Lostwithiel Town Band. A highlight for the children was seeing how big a Tuba actually is! The year 2 Children at Biscovey Infants performed a cornet extravaganza to a hall packed with their families and friends and was a huge hit with all who attended. The year 4 and 5 children of St Issey performed their concert with the newly named Triggetty Winds! Triggetty Winds (previously Next Steps Marhamchurch / Wadebridge) performed at the Annual Mince Pie Concert with Trigg Winds, Trigg Strings, and All Star Percussion. It was inspiring for the children at St Issey as they became part of a larger ensemble.

Hopefully the experience of learning an instrument will have inspired some children to wish to carry on learning a brass instrument, or maybe planted a seed for them to carry on with another musical instrument and is the beginning of their own musical journey.

So moving on to the Spring term and I'll be working on two projects. One project is working alongside Wheal Martyn to celebrate 200yrs of China Clay in the area, and the other project is working with the Regimental Museum in Bodmin with our focus this year being WW2. Children from Whitemoor, Mevagissey, and Roche will be working on the project at Wheal Martyn, whilst chidren from Lanivet, Cardinham, and a group of Home Educated Children will be working on the project at the Regimental Museum. Finally this coming term it's great to be working with Nansleddon School that has only recently opened. I will be providing some First Access Brass for the children there.

Livewire Update

With support from Cornwall Music Education Hub Livewire Youth Music will be continuing to support young musicians throughout Cornwall with free Saturday recording sessions in our studio, which was very generously equipped by legendary Who guitarist Pete Townshend, this will be our third year working in partnership with CMEH. As part of our commitment to young people a good number of these sessions are targeted at vulnerable young people, those in care, those struggling with emotional issues and those who otherwise for financial reasons would normally be able to afford professional studio time.

In addition to the free recording sessions and again with CMEH support we offer free studio technology sessions on Thursday evenings, when Pete Townshend fitted out our studio his two requests where to 1. Record as many young people as possible for free and also 2. To teach as many young people as possible how the studio works, we operate Logic Pro, Pro Tools and Abebleton Live, again these sessions we try and prioritise those young people who wouldn't otherwise have access to professional studio facilities and also to encourage more young women to get involved in studio technology. Whilst Livewire works with ALL young people within our senior age range (13 to 21) we recognise that women make up less than 5% of music industry technical trades and therefore one of our other aims is to try and address that.

Other activities Livewire offers young people include FREE Music lessons, Band Development sessions, free rehearsal space, social activities. Aside of the music activities Livewire also offers a wide range of well being and mental health services for young people including a team of 10 counsellors and NO waiting lists.

Introducing Kevrenna Records

The Cornwall Music Education Hub's record label now has a name - Kevrenna Records (meaning to share)! As part of our work to support young people with creating new music to be released through this label, Ryan Jones has been working with secondary schools in mid-Cornwall on a songwriting programme.

The first phase of the Hub's record label project has been a great success. Some wonderful songs have been crafted ready for recording! Students from Camborne science and technology college, Treviglas and Richard Lander have been writing songs with Ryan Jones over the last few months. They have created some fantastic musical works as well as creating some powerful pieces of creative writing throughout their lyric writing phase.

Each school opted for a different way of building interest in the project. Camborne choose to have a focused, week long writing and sequencing project for their GCSE music students and year 10's, Treviglas opted for an after school club (which was very well attended) and Richard lander used the platform to support their key stage 3 students. We have also been working with young people from Zebedee's cafe in Truro and Ryan has taken the project to Nine Maidens School with funding from Rio. We're now excited to offer the platform to other schools across Cornwall. We will be looking at writing and recording music ready for our first release in the Summer.

FUNDING FOR WHOLE CLASS INSTRUMENTAL LESSONS



Would you like your students to try out learning an instrument for free?

The Hub is able to offer grants to schools to fund a music specialist to deliver whole class instrumental lessons. The grants are available to fund a 12 week programme called *First Access* which aims to introduce students (and their teacher!) in Key Stages 1-3 to learning an instrument.

How does it work?

- School receives 10 weekly 45 minute whole class lessons (students should learn the same instrument each week), with a planning meeting at the start and a review meeting at the end
- The grants are available for any classes who have not previously benefitted from the scheme (schools can access for more than one class).
- Schools choose the deliverer for the sessions and also source their own instruments.
- The Hub can help with this as we have a list of teachers who are able to deliver First Access and also sets of instruments which can be hired at the subsidised rate of £70 per set per term.
- School pays the deliverer and claims back the cost after the sessions by sending in review notes, register, school music plan and an invoice

Music Lesson Subsidy Scheme Changes

The Hub offers a subsidy scheme for instrumental and vocal lessons which enables students to have lessons for either free or at a lower cost. Lessons must be delivered by a teacher who is registered with the Hub.

From 1st April, the criteria will be changing which will mean that children of services families will no longer be eligible for the full lesson subsidy. Instead they will be eligible for a 50% subsidy up to a maximum of £2.50 per lesson. Subsidies for Children in Care, children on Free School Meals and Families in receipt of DLA/PIP will remain the same. Unfortunately we have had to make this change as the demand for subsidies continues to grow but the amount of funding available for the subsidies remains the same.
