This is an introductory 4-day course on Dyadic Developmental Practice (DDP), an intervention model developed by Dan Hughes, Clinical Psychologist. This approach assists therapists and other professionals to understand and effectively support children, young people and their families. In this model, theory and research in the areas of developmental trauma, attachment theory, intersubjectivity and child development are integrated to produce a therapeutic approach used for relationship development and trauma resolution. DDP recognises the vital role which adoptive parents, foster carers and residential workers play as primary attachment figures in the recovery of traumatised, attachment-resistant children. The principles and interventions are presented through formal presentations, discussion, videotape of sessions, role-play, and handouts.

BEING A COMPASSIONATE AND REFLECTIVE EMPLOYEE (USING AN ATTITUDE OF PACE)

KEEPING LANGUAGE IN MIND

Developmental Language Disorders (DLD) have been called "the most common disability you will never have heard of" (Prof Courtenay Norbury). DLD is 10 times more common than autism and affects around 2 pupils in every class of 30. However, it can be difficult to identify and often goes unrecognised especially in children and young people who are at risk of school exclusion, are in care, are presenting with mental health difficulties, are vulnerable to exploitation, or known to youth offending and drug and alcohol services. This presentation will explore the impact of DLD and Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) on children and young people's development and behaviour. It will look at the implications for emotional well-being, education and social relationships. This presentation aims to raise awareness about DLD and is suitable for all those working with vulnerable children and young people including teachers, teaching assistants, therapists, residential home support workers.

The training highlights the available guiding research and introduces a structured assessment process to consider those factors research identifies as salient. This training is suitable for social workers, children's guardians, adoption agency workers, psychologists, solicitors and other professionals working in this field.

Due to the nature of their roles, health and social care professionals are routinely exposed to high levels of psychological trauma. This work has an impact on their psychological health and is often cumulative. Over time, it can lead to mental health difficulties in staff with the associated human and financial cost of sickness absence and low staff retention. This workshop will raise awareness about the risks of vicarious trauma to health and social care staff and to equip individuals with ideas and strategies to prevent it from occurring and reduce the impact of vicarious trauma.

This training is suitable for social workers, children's guardians, adoption and foster care agency workers, psychologists, solicitors and other professionals working in this field.

UNDERSTANDING ATTACHMENT AND TRAUMA - USING AN ATTITUDE OF PACE

Dr Molly Bodinetz, Senior Clinical Psychologist & Dr Emma Corrigan Senior Education and Community

Location: Exeter, Devon



This will be an interactive training day for any professional who works with children, young people and adolescents, such as social workers, teachers, teaching assistants, therapists, psychologists, children's residential home support workers and managers. This training will develop a deeper understanding of attachment and trauma, and to discover strategies to best support a child who has experienced trauma. 'PACE' (Playfulness, Acceptance, Curiosity and Empathy) was developed by Dan Hughes, a Clinical Psychologist who specialises in attachment and trauma which enables key adults to support children in developing their self-awareness, emotional intelligence and resilience. PACE has been shown to be particularly useful with children who have experienced trauma and neglect. This course will be facilitated by a clinician who specialises in child mental health. PACE training would be beneficial for professionals who work with children and adolescents such as social workers, family support workers and mental health professionals.

This training would be ideal for professionals who already have an awareness and understanding of PACE, trauma and attachment – but are needing a training to revisit and recap these areas, but mainly to develop an even wider knowledge and understanding, and to be able to apply more strategies in their working day.



DYADIC DEVELOPMENT PRACTICE (DDP) TRAINING - LEVEL 2

This four day course is open to those professionals who have undertaken Level 1 training and are beginning to use the principles and interventions of Dyadic Developmental Practice, Parenting and Psychotherapy in their day to day work. It focuses on gaining a deeper understanding of the theory, successes and barriers experienced by participants in applying the model in practice, more videos and discussion of DDP and the impact of participant's own attachment experiences.

It is helpful if participants have examples of their own DDP practice, such as case studies and/or recordings, to share with the group.

The training will provide an understanding and creative ideas about how to help when working with children or adults whose emotional brain development has been affected by their adverse childhood experiences.

Nurturing Attachments Group – For Adoptive Parents and Special Guardians Dates to be confirmed.

In 2020 we will be running a Nurturing Attachments Group, based on the programme developed by Kim Golding, for adoptive parents and Special Guardians. The group will be developing a deeper understanding of attachment theory and the impact of trauma on children's development and security. The group will provide ideas and approaches that carers and parents can demonstrate with their child(ren) to develop a safe and secure attachment and environment. Baby Bonding Group – for parents of babies aged 0 – 9 months.

This group will be a weekly group, consisting of 12, two hour sessions. The group will be relaxed and supportive group expertly facilitated by two of our clinicians, experienced in child and parent mental health. The group will provide support and nurture for parents and include discussion, sensory input, parental self-care and opportunities for reflection. Supporting parents to be a safe, secure and consistent presence for their babies is known to increase the 'feel-good' chemicals in their baby's brain necessary for building a secure attachment. This group will also provide the most vulnerable parents an increased chance to bond with their babies and help prevent the risk of parent/baby separation. Emotional Literacy Support Assistant (ELSA) Training £600 per place
Dates to be confirmed
Location: Cornwall.

The ELSA (Emotional Literacy Support Assistant) project was originally developed in Southampton by Educational Psychologist Sheila Burton, and now consists of a network of practitioners across the UK. ELSA training was designed to build capacity within schools to respond to the emotional needs of their pupils; it recognises that children and young people learn better and are happier in school if their emotional needs are addressed. ELSA is an extremely flexible programme. Trained ELSAs will work both with individual young people, and with small groups. They may focus on helping support the development of emotional literacy skills, or social skills, or on providing more targeted intervention where children have significant challenges such as attachment needs, anxiety, or when they face challenges at home. They often help children find appropriate ways of expressing their emotions, and play a key role in pastoral support in any school system.

The training is typically delivered over six days, usually one day per week, in order to give trainees time to practise and reflect on skills learned between sessions. To register your interest in this group, please email Kaley. Gibbs@psychologyassociates.org.uk.
