Ellie says "Through turning our attention to internationally renowned models and discussing the local, grass roots projects in Cornwall, we will be in a better place to take positive action to enrich and empower individuals living in our communities."

The children and young people, from Penryn Primary Academy and Penryn College, have been taking part in a creative correspondence pilot called Passing the Parcel, together with members of the local memory cafe. The notion behind the project is to unwrap the layers in society to discover a place at the heart of communities to where we all belong. Our aim is to create a community where people living with dementia can live safely and comfortably in any town. Children and students also attend this event in many places. We hope it stimulates intergenerational relations and every place will be an inclusive one as well. In Japan, there are people who want to overcome various misunderstandings and prejudices about dementia, and be the heroes/heroines in their own lives. There are also people who want to build a society where that is possible, together with those people. This project was launched to support and encourage such frontrunners. To enjoy every-day. To live positively. To help each other, to dream, and to live. Going beyond thoughts of what you can or can't do, and creating an environment where people can go on living together with others while not giving in to a feeling of hopelessness even if the things you cannot do increase. Passing the Parcel

Since March 2018 Ellie Robinson-Carter and Sally Crabtree have been collaborating on their project Passing the Parcel. The project is a creative correspondence project, connecting the generations. Funded by FEAST and the Big Lottery, Pass the Parcel has been piloted in Penryn between the memory cafe and children from Penryn Primary School and year 9 students at Penryn College. Ellie and Sally will reveal the highlights of the project along with the exciting news of Passing the Parcel coming to more communities in Cornwall.

Desdemona McCannon, Ashridge Field School

In a big, old house in rural Devon Desdemona hosts an annual Field School at her family home. Here artists, their families are invited to run activities and participate in creative practice. The outcome is quite special: creative ideas and making is shared across generations. Desdemona will shed light on her thinkings behind the school, the stories that have come from it and why creative, intergenerational practice is like no other.

Jayne Howard, Arts Well and Alice Browning, Little Bird Music

Chorus Connections is an intergenerational music programme that brings children and older people together in their communities to enjoy singing and music in weekly workshops. The programme is being delivered by Little Bird Music in partnership with Arts Well and will bring together children from Truro Nursery School and residents from Mountford House Care Home for a weekly music session, between November 2018 and summer 2019.
